The same shall be evaluated cumulatively in the Comprehensive Viva under Paper: MOOT COURT EXERCISE AND INTERNSHIP, PAPER CODE: BBL- 1005 (CLINICAL COURSE- IV) in X Semester.

#### Mode of Evaluation and Distribution of Marks:

Each subject shall carry total of 100 marks. There will be semester end written examination for the entire subject conducted by Examination Division of the University for 60 Marks. In each course in each semester there shall be Internal-examinations of 40 marks through written evaluation as part of continuous assessment by the subject teacher concerned.

#### Note:

- 1. The total number of Marks of the BBA LL.B. (HONS.) Programme is 5800 Marks.
- 2. Each student shall be required to appear for examination in all the papers of the course and secure 2900 Marks for the award of BBA LL.B. (HONS.) degree.
- 3. If student fail maximum in two subjects in a semester than student will get ATKT (Allow to Keep Term). And student can appear in these papers in next year examination as an ATKT student.







#### SYSTEM OF EXAMINATION

Each paper shall be of 100 Marks out of which 40 Marks shall be for Internal Assessment (IA) and 60 Marks shall be for University Examination (UE). Internal Assessment (IA) and University Examination (UE) shall be conducted by the Institute for each paper.

#### THE CREDIT SYSTEM:

The credits specified for BBA LL.B.(Honours) 5 years Integrated programme describe the weightages of various courses of the programme. The number of credits along with grade points that the student has satisfactorily completed measures the performance of the student. Satisfactory progress of a student is subject to his/ her maintaining a minimum Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA), as well as minimum grades in different courses of the programme. A certain number of credits must be earned by the student to qualify for the degree. Description of credit distribution for core Courses, elective Courses, and language course has already been shown.

#### EVALUATION AND COMPUTATION OF THE GRADE POINT AVERAGES:

Cumulative performance indicators such as GPA, SGPA or CGPA shall be calculated as described and illustrated below.

- I. The performances at UE and IA will be combined to obtain the Grade Point Average (GPA) for the Course/ Paper.
- II. The Weights for performance at UE and IA shall respectively be 60% and 40%.
- III. The Grade Point Average (GPA) for a Course/ Paper shall be calculated by first finding the total marks out of 100 for the Course/ Paper.
- IV. Two kinds of performance indicators, namely, the Semester Grade point

  Average (SGPA) and the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) shall be computed
  at the end of each term. The SGPA measures the cumulative performance of a learner
  in all the Courses/ Paper in a particular Semester, while CGPA measures the cumulative
  performance in all courses/ papers since his/her enrolment. The CGPA of when he/she
  completes the programme is the Final Result of the learner.

#### STANDARDS OF PASSING

- A) To pass in a Semester, a student must obtain a minimum grade point of 6.00 (50%) both at the UE and IA.
- B) A student who passes in a Course/ Paper is said to have completed the Credits assigned to the Course/ Paper.
- C) A Student who completed the minimum credits required for aprogramme will be declared to have completed the programme.
- D) The minimum passing grade shall be Grade 'B' for each Semester.

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## RULES OF PROMOTION FOR BBA LL.B. (HONOURS) 5-YEAR INTEGRATED PROGRAMME

In BBA LL.B. (Honours) 5-year Integrated Programme, a student who is admitted in 1st year, subject to the clearance of eligibility and after securing required credits for that year, shall automatically be promoted to next year. However, a Candidate who has not put minimum credits shall not be promoted to next year of the programme. To get a promotion in the 3rd year, the Candidate has to pass all the papers of the 1st year with a minimum of 6.00 grade points in each paper at both the University Examination and Internal Examination. Similarly, to get promotion to 4th Year, a Candidate has to pass in all the papers of 1st year and 2nd year. To get promotion in last year of a Candidate has to pass in all the papers of 1st year, 2nd year and 3rd year of the programme.

#### SINGLE DEGREE:

As per the UGC rules, a Candidate admitted in **BBA LL.B.** (Honours) 5 Years Integrated **Programme** is entitled to Single Degree only *BBA LL.B.* (Honours) that too after the successful completion of 5 years programme. They shall not be entitled to Dual Degree as the duration of the Programme is only five years.
